

## **Child Welfare Reading List**

This resource list aims to provide materials related to what is traditionally referred to as the child welfare system—its history, its current practices, its impacts, and its intersections with other systems. Also included are materials exploring approaches and movements for advocacy related to this system. Because this list is a resource for learning and continuing dialogue, links will be updated periodically to reflect and elevate narratives and research as they become available.
